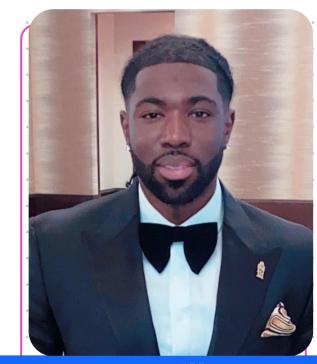

Why Rethink ISS?

Traditional ISS is *punitive*, not *supportive*

ISS can be an *opportunity for intervention*, not just isolation

Gives a chance to *re-engage students meaningfully*



MTSS in Alternative Settings: Why It Matters

Increased risk factors including trauma, disengagement, gaps

ISS as a high-leverage point for re-engagement



Building a Positive Foundation

Establish *predictable routines and expectations*

Culturally responsive and trauma-informed environment



Universal SEL & Behavior Supports in ISS

Mindfulness, regulation stations, daily check-ins

Student voice and choice activities



Academic Continuity in ISS

Access to *grade-level materials*

Support from instructional coaches or virtual tutors



Identifying Students Needing More

Use data: office referrals, attendance, grades

Observation and teacher input



What Tier 2 Looks Like in ISS

Brief **SEL skill groups**

Restorative conversations

Behavior contracts and *mentoring*



When ISS Reveals Deeper Needs

Patterns of removal = **signal**, **not symptom**

Connect to school-based mental health, FBA/BIP



Tier 3 Supports in Alternative Settings

1:1 counseling while in ISS

Daily *goal tracking*, trauma-informed *behavior plans*



Student-Centered Planning

Student-Led conferences

Re-entry *meeting*, that include *voice* + *choice*

Why Trauma-Informed Practice?

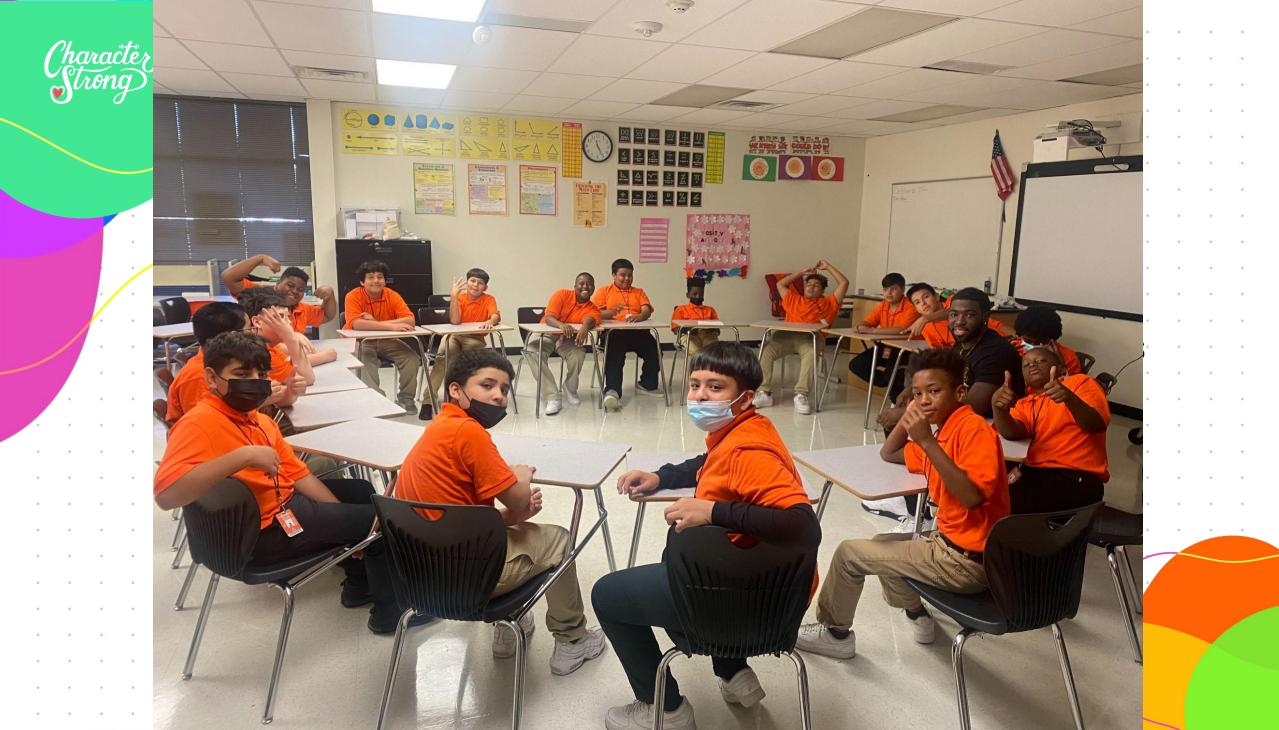
- High ACEs prevalence in alternative settings
- Brain science of regulation and connection



Responsive Practices in ISS

Circles, reflection sheets, harm-repair conversations

Teach **skills**, not just **punish behaviors**

- Building a support team mindset

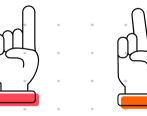


SISS Do's and Don'ts

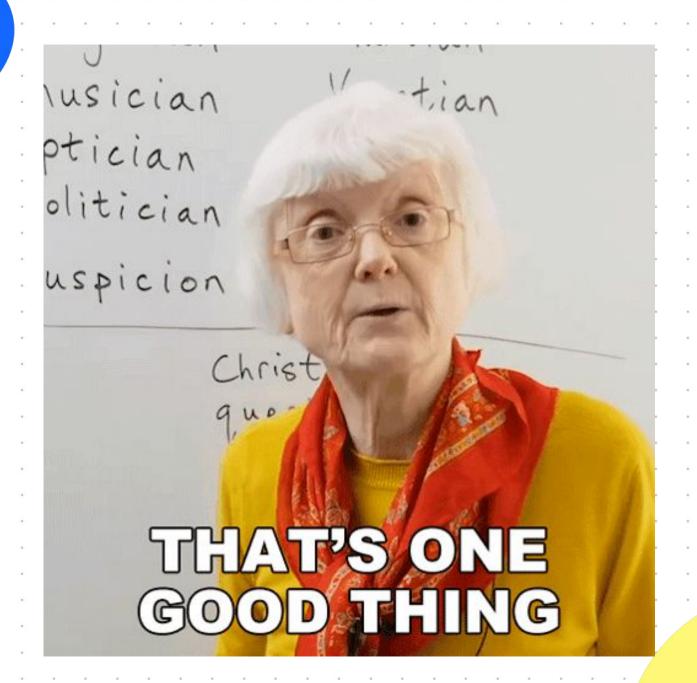
